

IN BRIEF Widgee-black spot for mobiles

Federal MP for Wide Bay, Warren Truss, has again called on the Federal Government to extend mobile telephone coverage to Widgee. Mr Truss said Labor axed the previous Coalition Government's mobile phone black spots program which provided assistance to telecommunication providers to build new towers in uneconomic areas. "With the latest change to Labor's Ministry, I am asking the Government to respond to the community's need.

LNP commits \$1.991 billion to upgrade Bruce thru Wide Bay

Down Memory Lane Sugar History

A reader requested we include some of the history of the Mt Bauple Mill Tramway/Rail line which operated from 1896 till 1950. As I researched the subject at the museum, I realized that to understand the tramways, we need to understand the history of this area as one of the larger sugar growers.

The Sugar Industry. Sugar production started in Queensland in 1862. During the two following decades whilst the industry was in its infancy, the crushing of sweet juice from cane was carried out at many small privatelyowned mills.

Many of these mills were simply farmyard affairs, used by the one grower for his own crop. In fact, some landowners grew their own cane, crushed it and produced their own rather low grade sugar. Others grew and crushed the cane and sent the juice for purification and crystallization to juice mills' or distilleries.

According to government statistics, there were no fewer than 166 mills in operation in the years 1884 and 1885. Their average size can be judged by their average output per annum – less than 337 tons. In 1975, 31 mills spread throughout Queensland processed 16m tonnes (17.5m tons) of cane to produce 2 million tonnes of sugar. In 2012 the total Queensland crush was 30 million tonnes, with Maryborough crushing 665,000 tonnes.

Forced Labourers. As the industry grew in its early days Pacific Islanders were indentured to provide labour to operate the larger estates. Though Kanaka labour had been used from as early as 1863, the heavier demand generated by the industry's expansion led to a shortage of volunteers and to the notorious "Blackbirding" which stains Queensland's history. A Royal Commission appointed in 1885 compelled the Griffith Government to enact legislation to abolish the importation of Polynesian



labour after a 5 year adjustment period. **Co-Ops.** The Government, intent of keeping the Sugar industry viable, allotted £50,000 to assist farmers to plant and supply cane to specially erected district mills that formed part of the cooperative system. The first 2 mills erected under this system were in the Mackay area. Other mills were built, but 91 other mills did not last beyond 1920.

Tram Loans. Further incentives were given under the sugar Works Guarantee Act of 1893, authorising loans from Treasury for establishing approved sugar works, including the purchase of machinery and construction of Mill Tramways. Generous repayment terms were offered with the aim of assisting the industry still beset with grave labour problems.

Bauple Mill. The outcome was the erection of new mills across Queensland including the Mt Bauple Mill, the first of its kind in the Maryborough district. Farmers had previously relied largely on the refinery at Yengarrie. Bauple's inauguration was mainly through the efforts of a Mr. McKellar who became its first secretary. £32,480 was obtained and in 1895 Walkers Ltd won the tender to supply and erect a complete milling plant. Crushing started on the 14th July

1896 and during the first season 10,314 tons of cane was crushed and 982 tons of sugar was produced. The product was bagged and hauled in horse drawn drays along the main road to Tiaro railway about 6 1/2 miles and unloaded into rail wagons.

Rail Line. A request to the Commissioner of Railways for a line constructed to the main line at Netherby was rejected. Then, Dr Walter Maxwell–director of sugar experimental stations, reported that the mill had the capability to process 4000 tons a season and was working at half pace due to the lack of transport getting cane to the mill and sugar to the rail head...hence the start of the construction of 2ft gauge tramlines. Andrew William Jamieson

Private No 383

42nd Battalion, B Company, WWI

Andrew (Bill) was born in 1887 at Liars, Queensland. (It is also recorded he was born at Miva). He attended Gundiah State School and was a farmer by trade. He lived at Netherby via Tiaro. He was one of nine children of John & Catherine Jamieson of Netherby, and never married. At the time he enlisted his mother was a widow, and had lost her eldest son.

Bill enlisted in the Army 19th October, 1915 as a private with his embarkation roll no. 23/59/1. His unit embarked from Sydney NSW on board HMAT A30 Borda on the 5th June 1916.

He was killed in action at Messines Belgium on the 31st July 1917 at the age of 30. His place of burial is at Wulverghem-Lindenhoek Road Military Cemetery (Plot 11, Row F, Grave No. 210) Belgium. LEST WE FORGET

Early Australian History and the Tree.


We Need Trees IV An essay by Col Bowman, continued from July Gazette.)

The gold rush era during the 1800s brought free men galore and while most did not prosper in the gold fields. The fact that land could be had from the Government of the day on a 99 year lease made Australia a desirable destination for people who valued ownership of land. These immigrants often came from countries where the land was controlled by the ruling class, and the people often were looked on as cheap labour.

This growing population increased imports and exports and opened the way for newcomers to set up in trades and other business. Farming, in particular, with crops such as wheat, wool, timber, gold and other products added to Australian income. This increased the value of imports and exports and increased the standard of living. We now could be defined as self-employed capitalists, not serfs working for a master.

The timber export was rough sawn hardwood for ship components, red **cedar** for internal finish in buildings and furniture. Additionally, due to the British colonies also including China and India, Australian native sandalwood was exported for incense.

Gold, Wheat and Wool were sent to Great Britain in jute bags and bales. The wooden ships were not water tight, which created a high humidity level in the ship's hold. As the cargo was always paid for by weight across the scales in GB it was said that the moisture the produce absorbed on the trip, (increasing the *weight)*, in fact paid the freight cost.
