Gundy pitches in for Ryder

People came from all around to give of their time and support a fundraiser for Ryder Sweetnam at the Gundy Pub.

This is not unusual as people as far away as Melbourne, Abu Dhabi and Sweden are also making efforts to raise the \$30K needed to send the family to the USA for a 7 week heavy duty'Therasuit' therapy session. The therapy is designed to help Ryder improve his strength and coordination with goals such as holding his head up and learning to drink through a straw. These are small goals but giant hurdles for Ryder.

Janene Sweetnam said that the fundraising will help Ryder get to the USA sooner."If we left it to our personal savings, it would take a lot longer to get him this help. We are mindful of all the generous efforts of many friends and strangers. These improvements we are working for will make a big difference to the family as a whole."

Ryder was born with calcifications on

the brain and has Cerebral Palsy, Epilepsy and Vision impairment.

Local Gundiah mum, Ally Willis, organised the fundraiser and was overwhelmed by community spirit."I heard about Ryder and felt I could help. It has been well worth all the hard work.

"It turned out to be a fantastic day. We had Seven and WIN News arrive, the Wide Bay Rodders came and donated \$1600. Dick Elmer's donated \$1000, we managed to raise about \$4500 on the day. A huge thank you to Renelle and staff, Luke Howell and those who donated big or small."

Since this event, a 24hr paddleathon in early October raised \$6000. The last big fundraiser for the year will be in Hervey Bay at Z PAC theatre on 16 November, a fun filled musicians night. Musicians wanting to play can contact George or Suzi at sgedd9@westnet.com.




Rossendale Tennis Club Gets Going!

Ombudsman Review

Yolande Bromet was recently interviewed on the ABC radio re Bauple as a'town on hold' because of curious council planning processes. It has been one year since the Bauple shop was forced to close. We Need Trees by Col Bowman, continued from August. Paddle Steamers. While commercial sailing ships were used for passengers and freight between countries, the paddle wheel steamer was the water transport used in early Australia, particularly in the initial settlement areas of the Murray, Murrumbidgee and Darling river systems of South East Australia. In 1853 William Randall launched the first steamer PS Mary Ann at Mannum in SA. He was trying to gain the £100 reward the fledgling SA State Government had posted to encourage development of trade with the NSW and Victorian goldfields, as SA had no gold. (In 1852, Victoria had produced 33% of the world's gold.)

Because Australian rivers are shallow, narrow, twisting waterways in a country with reliable droughts, our paddle wheelers were flat bottom shallow draught vessels with smaller paddle wheels on either side which could be driven at different speeds for steering. (In flood times, the paddle wheelers could cut corners to lessen distance but were known to get stranded on land when the flood waters receded.) The paddle steamers were fast and efficient compared to bullock wagons, taking days and weeks-not months-to get the produce to market.

Tree Power. They used river water boiled to steam for power and the ubiquitous River Red Gum was used to fire the boilers. (The river water was cleaned using Alum, used for centuries by Indian and Roman civilisations to flocculate the water.) The timber was supplied by contractors who sold the wood from stockpiles on the wharf or from river banks.

Steam engines were used in all types of machines-stationary as well as wheeled and marine-and while they eventually gave way to coal, oil, diesel and nuclear energy as a fuel source, they were originally powered by trees.

Today. Australia has one of the worlds largest paddle wheeler boat fleets and are mainly used in the tourism industry.

IN BRIEF Mad about Clive Palmer's false claims

State Member for Maryborough Anne Maddern has hit back at blatantly false claims by Clive Palmer about the Maryborough Hospital. "Mr Palmer's comments about the Maryborough Hospital are outrageous and untrue." Mrs Maddern said that in the last eighteen months significant improvements have been made at the Maryborough Hospital including the establishment of a centre of excellence rehabilitation facility for the Fraser Coast. Waiting lists for endoscopies and colonoscopies have been reduced by utilizing a third operating theatre. Additionally, there are two operating theatres for day surgery. Subacute care has been improved with an increase in patients flows of up to three times that under Labor. Finally, additional dental chairs and dentists has seen a reduction in the waiting list by more than 700 in a three month period.

Watching Tiaro water

18th September. The MRCCC's Steve Burgess talked about freshwater ecology and water quality in the lower Mary. He encouraged locals to become involved in a volunteer community Waterwatch network, with equipment provided by the MRCCC. Water quality data collected by volunteers enables the health of the river and creeks to be monitored over a long period of time, and also creates a network of "eyes on the ground" for observing changes in the river. Road Toll Data.

Australian road deaths are under 1,500 per year, less than in 1935, despite the great increase in the number of motor vehicles, far more powerful cars and trucks, and the population having more than tripled in size, from 7-million to 23-million.


Statistics were kept only from 1925 on, and in the 45 years to 1970 160,700 people had died on Australian roads, an average of 3,555 per year. This total is more than the combined total of those killed in the world wars, Korea and Vietnam. In 1970 there were 3,798 road deaths. Predictions were that the annual road toll would increase to 5,000 by 2005. For the 2000-2009 decade, it was expected that 56,900 would die on the roads, but the actual figure was 16,277. The causes for the decline in fatalities were better roads, better cars and safety measures in design of both. In 2012, 1,309 people died on our roads, about the same as for 1935, 77 years earlier.

On 12th April 1923, a son was born to Roy and Lena Crouch at Cooroy. He was named Gordon Maxwell and was their 8th child. The others were Maud, Theo, Ena, Alan, Elsie, Frances and Harrington, after Gordon came Ailsa, Ruby and Nellie.

Roy and Lena were share farming for Cecile Hetherington late of Gympie and it was a case of many hands make light work. Gordon went to Theebine School and also went to Church and Sunday school there. Observation the Sabbath in those days saw crowds of people assembling in the local hall for the church service and all their horses and sulkies lined up under the trees.

In his spare time, Gordon enjoyed playing tennis and football, but the best of all was dancing. After leaving school Gordon worked on his father's dairy farm.

On 8th November, Gordon and his brother Harrington enlisted in the R.A.A.F in Brisbane. He went on and gained his pilot's license at Wagga Wagga. On the 29th July 1942, he sailed for Canada where he was lucky enough to be billeted with a Presbyterian Minister and family. He was then sent to England where he underwent extensive night flying training.

He was killed on the 29th February 1944 at the age of 21 while piloting a Hurricane aircraft. He was buried in England at the British Ministry Cemetery.

His mate Keith Hoffman, who now resides in Sydney, wrote a tribute to Gordon in the Gympie Times 1st March 1945. LEST WE FORGET

DOWN MEMORY LANE

How GLEN ECHO came to be

An account of the pioneers of the Miva District would be incomplete without mention of the comparatively recent settlement of Glen Echo.

After the First World War, Glen Echo came into being as a soldier settlement. However, long before it was known as "Glen Echo", Mr Frederick Palfrey had taken up land in the area.

De Lisle c1890. Mr Palfrey was born at Isle Brewers, Somersetshire, England in 1867 and came to Queensland at the age of 17. For the first 5 years he worked for Mr G. Mant on "Gigoomgan" Station. He then began pig-raising and horse breeding for himself on "De Lisle" an outpost of "Gigoomgan". As a reward for having worked well for Mr Mant, Mr Palfrey was allowed to live rent free on "De Lisle".

Later he purchased the property. At one time Mr Palfrey had 399 pigs. When fit for market the pigs were driven on foot to Woolooga, the largest number taken this way being 101, of these 100 arrived safely at the rail trucks. He was also engaged in dairying, taking butter by pack horse to Gundiah and later Miva. Pigs were killed on "De Lisle" and cured bacon sold to shops in Gympie.

About 1893 Mr Palfrey married Hannah Ogilivie, daughter of Mr A. Ogilvie of "Burnside". In her teens Hannah was fortunate to have had a trip to the U.S.A. with her father. The Ogilvie's, though not strictly speaking belonging to the Miva District, used the Miva Railway Station to transport cheese made on Burnside. As a girl, Mrs Palfrey was an excellent cheesemaker, and a medal she received for the excellence of her cheeses is in the possession of her only son, Mr G. Palfrey of "De Lisle". The only surviving daughter of Mr and Mrs Frederick Palfrey is Mrs. N. Hibbett who lived on the adjoining property.

In 1900 Mr E.G. Raynor settled in this area and engaged in farming and timbergetting. He and his 2 sons had 2 bullock teams. In 1915 the Raynor family began fruit farming and were the first in the district to grow bananas. Mr. Raynor married a Miss Alley from near Emery's Bridge in the Gundiah District.

LonePine. In 1916 Messrs' Fred and Jack Krafft with Fred's wife and baby son Neil, arrived in a bullock wagon on their selection 'Lone Pine'. Fred and Jack engaged in timber –getting for some years before starting dairying. Fred can remember pine logs being rafted down the Munna Creek from 'Lone Pine' to Tiaro.

Petersons Pocket. About 1916, a block of country known as Petersons Pocket, owned by the Crown, was cut up into 8 blocks for soldier settlement. Around 1918 the first men arrived and selected their blocks. Among the early arrivals were Mr. H.D Neilsen, Mr Percy Staples and Mr H Raynor. Other blocks were taken up by civilians, among whom was Mr Tom Raynor. He cut his block into small fruit farms which were sold to Messrs' Bert Day, Percy Day, H Shapland and McKenzie.

Mr. E Raynor and sons cut a road through the scrub from their selection 'Font Hill' to Petersons Pocket. Later the government employed a gang of men to clear the road, at which time the name 'Petersons Pocket' was changed to 'Glen Echo', named by Mr Alex Nahrung's sister Mrs Andrew Thompson of Dulong, Nambour.

Soon the new settlement needed a school, the first teacher was Miss Mary Sheehan.
