Emergency Procedures

With the memory of the flooding during the last 2 wet seasons, see the steps for requesting Emergency Services.

The first step is to dial 000-ask for the service you need and follow advice given. An example is the Ambulance Service, if you call with an incident they will advise on treatment of the patient. If transport is required the operator will question you to gain knowledge of the patients whereabouts so it's essential you supply the patients address as they can identify the location of a phone call electronically and you may be calling from a different address to the patient. The Ambulance Officer will be aware of flooding or open roads and can send the required unit to the closest evacuation site to the patients address and advise if the patient needs to be transported to this evacuation site, wait for this advise and do not try to pre-empt this as it can lead to confusion and loss of critical time for the patient.

Golden Hour. We refer to the first hour after an accident/incident as "The Golden Hour" as the more that can be done for the patient in this hour, the better the outcome for the patient.

The Mens Shed provided a BBQ and had a fabulous stall with children's furniture. The Q150 group organised snow cones and a Bauple nut cracking competition. Family games such as sack races, three legged races, toad races, horse racing, with even Slingshot, the mechanical bull, proved popular. A parade of costumes and a chocolate wheel with numerous prizes added to the atmosphere. All in all, the organisers were well pleased, with the event concluding about 1pm.

Mungar. Tiaro Lions held Australia Day festivities at the A E Fielding Park at Mungar including a BBQ and drink service. They also conducted egg and spoon races, sack races and boot and thong throwing. The main event was 7-a-side cricket with 7 teams on a round robin basis. The **Hideaway Hooligans** won the Tiaro ashes for this year.

Tony Pope said, "I was in the thick of the cricket all day, but I imagine we had about 200 to the event. I like the idea of getting the areas back together and having combined Australia days."



New Local Laws


Under the new Local Law, owners of buildings within the Maryborough CBD Precinct designated area have a duty to maintain the appearance of their building. Council can now issue \$110 on-the-spot fines for people who continually let their allotments become overgrown. Council can assist businesses to keep up appearances with grants or, if necessary, with enforcement.

Other local law changes include the introduction of shopping trolley controls, requirements for people to remove graffiti from buildings and structures or no smoking within four metres of a bus stop or taxi rank. New laws also include the requirement that all cats must be desexed when they are sold or given away and the introduction of breeders' permits for cat and dog owners. Ads for cats and dogs for sale or to give away must now contain the breeders' permit number.

Tiaro Police Consultative Committee. Constable Paul Roberts reported to the committee that over the past 2 months Sept-Nov 2013 that there were 158 Incidents in the area compared with 181 for the same period last year.

Our Diggers: John Cecil Dowling

Private Q17064 Australian Army. 9th Australian Infantry

Little detail is known of John Dowling prior to his enlistment. Born 28th January 1918 in Nambour, his locality on enlistment was Pamona with next of kin named as Hazel Dowling.

In New Guinea, a small Militia and some admirable local volunteers were at first the only garrison, but by the time the Japanese began to press forward, the 7th Division with Major AS Allen was already arriving.

On the 26th August 1942, the Japanese trying to land at Milne Bay were defeated by the militia and AIF Brigade and were forced to withdraw by sea. Two RAAF Squadrons arrived to support the ground forces. During part of the fighting the only anti tank weapons the Aussies had were hand grenades. In the early stages they were driven back.

On the 31st August 1942, Pte. J. C. Dowling was killed, however the Japanese were unable to capture the air strip. From here the RAAF Kittyhawks swept at low levels to blast enemy positions in the thick coconut plantations and repeatedly raked the decks of the Japanese cruisers that came to support their land forces.

Japanese forces ceased on the 7th September and the battle cost the enemy at least a 1000 of their best troops.

Pte J.C. Dowling of Pomona was 24 years of age when he gave his life for his country. LEST WE FORGET

DOWN MEMORY LANE

Robinson Morries Cunningham

1862–1951 During the voyage to Australia in the sailing ship CITY OF BRISBANE Hellen (wife of John Cunningham) gave birth to her fifth son on the 21st April 1862.

The son was named after the Ship's captain David Morries, but his birth is registered in Queensland as 'Robert Morris'. Was it a deliberate change because the Captain disappeared with his ship the following year?? However, on another brother's birth certificate he was listed by his father as 'Robinson'.

He was a lad of seven when the family settled on the land at Tiaro and he soon learnt the workings of farming. When he was 15 he could handle his father's horse team well enough to carry goods between Maryborough and Tiaro and he continued until the railway line was built. He hauled logs from his fathers property and was the first to send them by rail to Mungar Sawmill.

Marriage. On the 15 June 1883 Robinson married Elizabeth Chambers Hawkins of Tiaro. Elizabeth (born 25 June 1865 at Helidon near Toowoomba) was the daughter of Robert and Ann Hawkins of the Railway Hotel Tiaro.(Elizabeth's younger sister, Mary Ellen, later married Stewart Crumby Cunningham, the younger brother of Robinson Morries.) Settling. For 5 years Robinson and Elizabeth lived in Tiaro. They moved to a property at Kanighan known as Bannockburn (c.1888) where they ran a dairy farm and supplied log timber. Robinson was the first to grow bananas and pawpaws in the district. (When his father died in 1907, Robinson's residence was said to be at Gootchie.)

In 1923, Robinson sold *Bannockhurn* and moved to Torquay for 5 years before returning to live at Bauple (c.1928). Two years later, in 1930, they sold their orchard at Bauple and built a house in Lennox Street, Maryborough. 4 years later, he sold this house and moved to Gympie where he stayed until his wife died in 1942. Elizabeth was buried in Maryborough Cemetery on the 19 June, she was 76. Robinson returned to Maryborough.

Octogenarian. In July 1946, Robinson Morries was photographed for the Chronicle with his 2 surviving brothers. They were the subject of an article "Three Octogenarians, the Cunningham brothers." Robinson was then 84 and lived at 7 Percy Street Maryborough. In November 1950, he presented a plaque to the Tiaro Council in honour of his pioneer parents John and Hellen Cunningham, the plaque was received by his nephew Stewart Alley Cunningham the Chairman of the Council. Robinson Morries died on the 26th No-

Robinson Morries died on the 26th November 1951 and was buried in Maryborough Cemetery. He was survived by his children Jessie Stuart, Jean Atkinson, Isabel Wilkins, Grace MacFarlane, John, Arthur, Alex Morries, Tom, Duncan and Walter. Trevor Keightley







lce Cream delight

Next time you go into Hungry Jacks or Macas, spare a thought for your parents, grandparents and anybody born before them, who had to make

their ice-cream by hand. Imagine wanting an ice-cream and being told that we will make some for the Saturday dance next week. (2 weeks away!) There were no freezers and it was a long, drawn-out, make-and-eat occasion and it was done like this, as reported by Iris Burgum:

"Mum used to make up a big dish of custard. In later years I asked her what was in it and as far as I can recall she said 'MILK, EGGS, CREAM, SUGAR, VANILLA'. That had to cool. The ice came from Brisbane on the bus in a canvas bag... and that could be any time. The mixture was put into the stainless steel container and put in the churn and covered with ice, which we had to cover with handfuls of coarse salt and let stand until it was chilled through. Then the work began, turning the handle of the churn. As the ice melted the water was poured off and more ice and salt added and at last, the lovely ice-cream was ready. I cannot remember how long it took but it seemed an awful long time, especially when it was your turn to turn the handle... then you had to decide if a penny or threepenny cone would suffice."

Iris, thanks for that, next time I have a 50cent soft serve at MacDonalds I will appreciate that I did not have to turn the handle – times have sure changed.
