Darryl Stewart chaired the meeting well, giving appropriate digs on local issues to be addressed by federal government. All candidates were given 10 minutes to introduce themselves and what they can offer the electorate.

The level of political experience and knowledge ranged greatly between the candidates, but they all exhibited passion and courage to put themselves in the firing line.

Questions from the floor included how exactly had taxpayer money funded their campaigns, concerns about red tape and getting things done, spending and deficits, and money for education. This is not a project for haste, we are talking multi millions of dollars. Already committed \$10 million of rate payers money and Howard not even sewered. I expect Council to undertake due diligence and respect the community that they represent. The report was missing 2,636 signatures opposing. How can they make a decision without all the facts? The Sports Precinct, besides rates, drugs, domestic violence, unemployment etc was the Local Election decider.

Herbert bert Claude Rayner was born on November 30, 1896, in Tiaro, the second son of Henry Rayner, 31 and Alice Rayner nee Ingham, 24. Herbert

and his siblings were second generation Australians, with his father also being born in Tiaro and his Grandfather immigrating from Norfolk, England around 1858.

His two brothers, Clemence and Edgar and a sister, Mabel, attended Tiaro State School and were of the Presbyterian faith. Herbert lost his father and grandfather around the age of 13.


Herbert was 19 when he enlisted on 18 February 1916. He was single and employed as a labourer.

His Unit embarked from Brisbane, Queensland, on board HMAT A46 Clan Macgillivray on 1 May 1916.

He was killed in action in the Battle of Messines on June 7, 1917, in Belgium, at the age of 20. He has no known grave and recorded as buried in Ieper, West-Vlaanderen, Belgium. He is memorialised on the The Ypres (Menin Gate) Memorial (Panel 27), Belgium.

Lunchtime History Talk

Friday July 8, noon at Maryborough Library. Maryborough's famous Lamington Bridge will be the subject of the next lunchtime local history talk to be presented by Deputy Mayor George Seymour at the Maryborough Library. Built 120 years ago in 1896, the Lamington Bridge has survived every flood following the record 1893 flood that destroyed its predecessor.

Down Memory Lane: The Browns of Bauple

Scottish descent. John Brown's grandfather, Daniel Brown, was a Scottish school teacher. His father, Archibald Crawford Brown, emigrated in 1879.

John (Jack) Brown was born in Taroom Qld, on 17 June 1883. Jack 'came from Bundaberg' to Bauple to work in the Sugar Mill.

Married. In 1914, he married Hannah Dempster, daughter of Martin Dempster and Hannah Gee of Bauple-early settlers in the area. Hannah's grandfather was from Northern Ireland. Hannah and John settled in Bauple and had 6 children – Edward (Ted), William Crawford (Bill), Archibald John (Archie), Elison (Elsie), Grace and Alan James (Jim). All the children attended the Raby/Bauple State School.

Bill, Ted and Archie were all members of the Bauple Brass Band. Bill and Ted both enlisted in the second World War and saw service overseas in the Middle East. **Mill Workers.** All the male members

worked in the Sugar Mill during crushing season and did odd jobs during the slack.

John was Secretary of the School committee and was heavily involved in the Committee founding the seaside resort of Tinninbah (Tinnanbar).

The family loved sport - Football, Cricket, Tennis and fishing. The boys were all good footballers and Archie played for Maryborough. The family would walk out to Tinana Creek when the creek had fresh in it. They were all

keen dancers and went to the dances at Bauple, Gundiah and Tiaro.

John died at age 60 - 21 October 1945 in Maryborough and was buried in Tiaro Cemetery. Maryborough Chronicle 30 October 1945 stated 'John's death was sudden. John was a resident of Bauple, but had also resided in Gympie for some time, where he was a member of the Pirates Club, a rugby union team. At the time of his death he was working for the Bauple Sugar Mill... He left behind a wife, four sons and two daughters.' *TK*



The Anne Report

Hello everyone

Here are a few details from the Council meeting 15 June:

Small Communities Portfolio. I am tasked with looking after the interests of all the outer lying communities,



both in Division 2 but also in other divisions. Small communities are great to work with and I'm very much looking forward to catching up with everyone over a period of time.

Sports Precinct. The report on the Sports Precinct was delivered, however, I have serious concerns about the validity of the data underlying the report. I am concerned that there will be significant on-going maintenance and management fees, ...the sporting communities away from the precinct will miss out on funding and upgrades, that there no consideration of facilities needed for older people to keep healthy and well...[and] that residents are not supportive of the idea. I voted against continuing with the precinct.

De-amalgamation. I moved a motion to acknowledge that there are a significant number of residents who feel disenfranchised as demonstrated by a petition tabled in Parliament and referred to in public participation at the May meeting..and to have a report on a process that might be followed for the consideration of the community. The motion was defeated 2/9.

Mobile Council Officers. Council will investigate an option to have mobile Council officers to out lying areas.

Bauple Sustainability. Even though the Bauple community is looking to grow their economic base, my motion to investigate re-opening the RV site on the Rec ground and therefore extending the RV options was defeated. The council feels we need to look to other options to grow the economy and are looking to members of the community to assist.

Less Funds for Foreshore. There has been a lot of work carried out on the Esplanade, it looks very nice, but now it is time to concentrate on other areas of Council responsibility.

RVs. We are collectively working to grow the RV industry. It seems numbers are increasing at the RV park at Tiaro and that is a start. Keep safe and stay well. Anne Madder

was born in 1916 at Maryborough's Lady Musgrave Hospital to timbercutter Ted Stockwell and his wife Cassie, and lived in Tiaro with her eight brother and sisters. Moya attended Tiaro State School, Maryborough Girls Grammar School and then trained as a teacher in Brisbane. After teaching on the Darling Downs, Moya married Fred Sonnenburg in 1941 and they had five children who attended Tiaro State School and high school in Maryborough.

Moya was very active in local affairs in Tiaro and taught at the State School until the family moved to John Street in Maryborough in January 1962.

Maryborough. Ms Sonnenburg taught briefly at the Christian Brothers' School and at Central State School until she retired at age 60. She travelled overseas a number of times and was a volunteer with Meals on Wheels and was president of Maitlia Potters (Bottle Brush Crafts) for many years. **Sunshine Coast.** At 89 she sold

her home and moved to live with her daughter on the Sunshine Coast.

When asked for her thoughts on reaching 100 Moya said"I just accepted getting older, but after I turned 90 I wondered about the future". "I hope to have good health, so as not to be a burden on anyone."I have really enjoyed my grandchildren and now their children; I'm Great Gran to them." Tinana Interchange starts August

Upgrade works are expected to begin in August on the \$38 million Tinana Interchange. The Georgiou Group had been selected to undertake the works. "Works will include the construction of a new overpass on to Maryborough-Hervey Bay Road, off-ramps and the introduction of a wide centre line treatment." Warren Truss/Llew O'Brien

Local Objection to Sports Complex.

Darryl Stewart, president of Tiaro Chamber and long term president of Maryborough and District Junior Cricket Committee, sent a lengthy rationale to Fraser Coast Councillors urging them to note local objection to the Hervey Bay Sports Precinct. He didn't mince words. They didn't listen. His main points were:

- •no provision for cricketing facilities
- •no provision for junior football
- •no athletic and field events catered to.
- •oversupply of hockey fields, football fields
- •facilities proposed are winter sports (except tennis) ~ complex unused for 50% of the year.
- •no provision for seating at least 10,000
- •peak time congestion (eg., Saturday mornings for junior sports) with
- •no provision for parking vehicles close to fields
- •little or no consultation with local associations.
- •no regional interest in permanently playing all sport at Nikenbah.
- not situated centrally~access issues
- •minimal permanent job increase.

"In short, it is the view of many regional and rural ratepayers that the concept is ill-conceived and designed to benefit the residents of Nikenbah and Hervey Bay, is being promoted in the wrong locality so that it will never be utilised as a major regional sports complex and there seems to be many aspects either under planned, over-planned or not planned at all. If Council wants a minority of the residents of Hervey Bay and, more particularly, Nikenbah, to have a new sporting precinct over and above the already existing sporting facilities, then it is strongly suggested that the present and future residents of Nikenbah and Hervey Bay pay for it. There are many other well-used regional sporting facilities that could really do with an injection of funds to improve the standard of far more sports than those to be accommodated at the Nikenbah proposal."

"Frankly, the Fraser Coast cannot afford to support such a narrow aspirational and extremely limited benefit project either now or into the foreseeable future. There are many other major infrastructure proposals across the Fraser Coast which would have far more benefits for all Fraser Coast residents." Darryl Stewart






