\$150,000 makeover for Tiaro RV site



Work started on the Tiaro RV site on 1st March. (above). RVers are directed to Petrie Park and Bauple.

Fraser Coast Council demonstrates support for RVs. The Council has started work on election promises for the Tiaro area with it's upgrade to the RV site.

"The project... should take around seven weeks to complete,"Small Communities Development Portfolio Councillor Anne Maddern said.

Darryl Stewart, President of Tiaro & District Chamber of Commerce said, "I'm happy about money spent in our region! We are looking forward to attracting more RVs. More travellers means more business."

Local company Q Civil will undertake the works which includes drainage improvements in Inman and Price Street, a new concrete driveway to make entering and leaving the site easier, planting grassed areas, fencing and footpaths linking to existing footpaths through the Tiaro Memorial Park.

Unfortunately the site will be closed as the work is undertaken.

Bauple wants RVs too. 1st March also saw Council unanimously pass their response to the Bauple Committee Report with approval for costs to be managed via the normal procedures.

The Bauple Economic and Community Report, among other things, reiterated the community's desire to have RVs come to town. Phil Jeffs, President of the Bauple Museum said, "We rely heavily on the RVs coming to town. At the end of the day, if we don't have RVs coming through the town, we've lost 90% of our visitors. We rely on their donations to help support our efforts and to keep the museum open."

"We are really excited the report was passed. We are looking forward to a professional consultant to help plan the best RV site for Bauple," said John Cummins of the BPA who has been tasked with implementing the report and liaising with Council on behalf of the community.

Consultant? The Community Report recommends Council hire a consultant to determine the best location for an RV site. However Council's response completely ignores this recommendation and instead tasks the community to decide between two site options.

Anne Maddern said, "It is considered that this matter [professional consultant] can be addressed under item 38 of the Council's response at a future date."

The Gazette asked Mrs Maddern for clarification of item #38 because her statement was in direct conflict with the unanimous Council resolution.

The Gazette has received no response 48 hours after request made. GG

Applying for Individually Droughted Property status

With ongoing dry conditions in our area, affected primary producers should consider applying to the Queensland Government for an Individually Droughted Property (IDP) declaration in order to access Drought Relief Assistance Scheme programs.

These include freight subsidies for transporting fodder or water, or for the Emergency Water Infrastructure Rebate. Assistance with other government fees and charges may also be available.

Further information on IDPs is available on the Dept. of Ag website. www.daff. qld.gov.au and follow the links. Or call 13 25 23 and ask for an application form. In considering an IDP, producers are encouraged not to self-assess but to go through the application process to find out if they meet the criteria.

The Department of Agriculture and Fisheries Climate Risk Coordinators are available to assist producers understand what they need to know for their individual circumstances.

The State Government usually revisits shire declarations in late March/early April at the end of the usual wet season period, with a Ministerial decision likely after Easter.

The number of IDPs provides evidence towards determining if an area should be declared drought affected by the Minister. Even if your application is unsuccessful, it helps to send a strong signal to Government that all is not well. Also it assists the local drought committee to make a fair determination and, if appropriate, a strong recommendation to the Minister.


Cane farms to improve reef health

The Gibraltar of the Orient

February 15 was the 75th anniversary of The Battle of Singapore, also known as the Fall of Singapore that was fought in the South-East Asian theatre of World War II when the Empire of Japan invaded the British stronghold of Singapore-nicknamed the "Gibraltar of the East"-shortly after the invasion of Pearl Harbour. Singapore was the major British military base in South-East Asia and was the keystone of British imperial interwar defence planning for South-East Asia as well as the South-West Pacific. The fighting in Singapore lasted from 8 to 15 February 1942 although this was preceded by two months of British resistance as Japanese forces advanced down the Malaya peninsula.

About 80,000 British, Indian and Australian troops became prisoners of war, joining 50,000 taken by the Japanese in the earlier Malayan Campaign.

The British prime minister, Winston Churchill, called it the "worst disaster" in British military history. Almost 15,000 Australians were taken prisoner when the island was surrendered to the Japanese. The only Australian decorated in this campaign was Lieutenant Colonel Charles Anderson, Commanding Officer of the 2/19 Battalion. He conducted a fighting withdrawal to Parit Sulong during which he and his men were cut off and suffered heavy casualties. Anderson led them through four days of heavy fighting in a bid to reach Allied lines. For his leadership, his protection of his own wounded men, and for repeatedly risking his own life Anderson was awarded the Victoria Cross.

Anderson was taken into captivity on 15 February 1942. He endured the misery and squalor of being a prisoner of war, commanding "Anderson force" on the Burma-Thailand Railway. Despite a high rate of death and illness, "he maintained a high level of morale among his men ... all of whom would have followed him to hell and back". After the war he returned to farming. In 1949 he was elected to parliament as Country Party member for Hume, New South Wales, and served three terms. LEST WE FORGET

Hoover 0307 Single Tub Washing Machine with hand wringer, the was first machine by Hoover at the Merthyr Tydfil factory, South Wales, UK.



It consisted of a single metal tub with the famous "Hoover Boiling Action Pulsator", a spinning disc in the side of the tub which produced swirling currents of water through which the clothes were moved.

It was a basic design, it didn't even have a switch, you just plugged it in and switched it on & off at the wall socket. As it had no electric pump, after washing you simply laid the hose into a bucket or drain, the empty hole in the base of the tub is very small but the vortex it produces is very powerful and it drains very quickly.

This model was great for the smaller family home as you could place it under a sink draining board or in a corner of the kitchen without taking up too much space, a great advantage over a copper or wash boiler.

It was last manufactured in 1957 after selling 325,000 of them. To use, simply fill it with hot water, add your washing powder and switch on for a minute to dissolve the soap powder, then add the clothes, around 4lbs (2kg) dry weight, and wash cottons for around 4 minutes and synthetics & delicates for 2 minutes. After washing you would feed the clothing through the hand wringer to force out the excess water.
